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MULTI-AGENCY THRESHOLD GUIDANCE IDENTIFYING NEED AND ANALYSING RISK WHEN WORKING WITH CHILDREN IN WALSALL

Key Principles Underpinning Our Practice:

Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility:

We need to work closely together to ensure that children and families get the right help at the right time to achieve their full potential.

Information Sharing:

Never assume someone else has passed the information on.

A Child Centred Approach:

Hear the child's voice and ensure all your intervention is rooted in child development.

Intervene Early:

Promoting the resilience of all children and intervening early to tackle problems that emerge will help to make this happen.

Parental Consent:

We should always seek parental consent. However, where parents refuse to give consent you need to make professional judgement about whether, without help, the needs of the child will increase.

Thresholds For Support

Children and young people have different needs and will need different types and levels of support to ensure that they meet their full potential both as children and later adults.

There are four levels of intervention:

Level 1

Universal Services

Level 2

Early help through a single agency response to identify additional needs.

Level 3

Early Help Additional Support—
a co-ordinated multiagency response to identify additional needs.

Level 4

Statutory Intervention of Children's Social Care.

Risk

One of the challenges when considering the needs of a child or young person is determining when a level of need may escalate, or has escalated, to the point where we consider that there may be a risk of significant harm to the well being of the child or young person.
